

The Ancient Egyptians, who believed that the number 13 meant good luck, rather than bad luck, originated the significance of the number 13. Their belief was that there were 12 steps up the ladder to eternal life and knowledge, and to take the thirteenth step meant going through death and into everlasting life. 13 was, for the Egyptians, associated with immortality.

13 being a symbol of bad luck came first from the Romans, who apparently found that the number 13 was associated with bad omens, particularly those resulting in death and destruction.

A common belief as to why the number 13 is bad luck nowadays is the Christian belief. At the last supper, Judas Iscariot was the thirteenth person to sit at the table where Jesus was sitting, and he would later

betray Jesus, leading to his crucifixion. This belief is the main reason why it's considered very bad luck for thirteen people to sit at one table. As Professor Trelawney says in Harry Potter and the Prisoner Of Azkaban, '...when thirteen dine together, the first to rise will be the first to die!'


Pisces 12 March - 18 April

Behind the sun, even when you cannot see them, are the stars and constellations. The particular constellation behind the sun at the time of your birth is known as your 'sun sign' or 'star sign'. Many people don't realise that these constellations are not spread out evenly across the sky. Some are small, with the sun passing through in a matter of days, some are much bigger with the sun taking well over a month to get to the other side. And, there are 13 signs, not 12. (In fact there are hundreds of constellations depending on the culture.) All this is simply ignored by magazine and newspaper Astrologers even though this information is freely available.



Many years ago, our ancestors had no idea what stars were or how far away they really are. By playing 'connectthe-dots', they found all sorts of shapes and patterns. Being clever and loving to tell stories, they made up all sorts of tales to try and explain the carpet of lights across



the night sky. Over the years, some of them began to believe these stories were true! Superstitions about the powers of the people and creatures in these stories became part of many cultures and are still with us today, mostly in newspaper Astrology columns. Astrology itself is not a science. Most of it is simply made up on

the spot to meet newspaper dead-lines.

How Astrology seems to work

Astrology relies on a number things, none of them magical powers from the stars and planets.

Probably the most important thing is what's known as 'Barnum statements' (named after the famous circus manager, P. T. Barnum). These are clever statements that seem to apply to anyone. For example:

You have considerable unused capacity that you have not turned to your advantage. Disciplined and self-controlled on the outside, you tend to be worrisome and insecure on the inside. At times you have serious doubts as to whether you have made the right decision or done the right thing.

One way to see if newspaper and magazine Astrologers are using Barnum statements is to ask your friend for their star sign. Say it's 'Aries'. You pretend to look for Aries, but in fact you pick another one like 'Leo' and read that one to

them. Then ask your friend how accurate they thought it was. You may be surprised how well this trick works. In fact, why not try making up your own Astrology column?

Barnum statements are one part of a far more interesting trick known as 'Cold Reading'. This is used by all sorts of fortune tellers from Tarot card readers to people to read tea leaves. With practise, anyone can learn cold reading, no magical powers needed.


The science of Astronomy, the fascinating way we find out about the real nature of the stars and planets, grew out of the superstition of Astrology. We now know that the stars that make up any constellation are all at different distances from us and only make up the patterns we see when viewed from our planet. In fact many of the stars we see no longer even exist even though the light they gave off hundreds and thousands of years ago is still reaching our eyes. Anyone today can play 'connect-a-dot' with the stars and come up with as many shapes and patterns as our ancestors.

Where oh Where is that Monster?

We have all heard of the famous monster of Loch Ness in Scotland. Sightings of "Nessy", have been reported for hundreds of years and there are even some fuzzy and blurry photos that seem to look like something, that could be a some kind of ... monster? Maybe.






Make an Origami Star

The real stars are millions and millions of kilometres away. Here's one way to make your own star a little closer to home.





To make this origami star, you will need 5 squares of paper, they can be any colour or coloured on one side and white on the other.

- 1. Fold your first square of paper in half.
- 2. Fold it in half again as shown.
- 3. Now fold in half and back again.
- 4. Fold up the very front flap only towards the top.
- 5. Now fold up the next flap...
- 6. ... and the next.
- 7. Fold up the last flap.
- 8. This is how your model should look. Fold it in half, taking the right side behind the left.
- With care, pinch and ease out each of the five points of the model so that the points swing out.
- 10. Do the same to the other 4 squares of paper, add a spot of glue where shown and slot them together.
- 11. This is how your model should look. You will notice that the last piece does not slot in. Fold the point shown into itself and add a spot of glue on the same area.
- 12. The finished star.
